

LESSONS LEARNED

in Higher Education During COVID-19 and Beyond

What lessons have we learned through teaching and learning during the global pandemic and where do we go from here?

To learn these lessons, we conducted an environmental scan, an exploratory literature review, and campus conversations. We began by gathering reports, podcasts, and blog posts about the impact of Covid-19 from U15s. We then reviewed and synthesized 39 published, peer-reviewed studies on the global impact of Covid-19 on teaching and learning. Finally, we spoke with 135 faculty, staff, and students from nine faculties and departments across UCalgary about their experiences teaching and learning through the pandemic, and their vision for teaching beyond Covid-19.

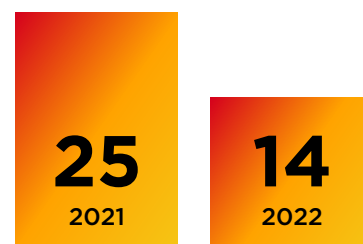
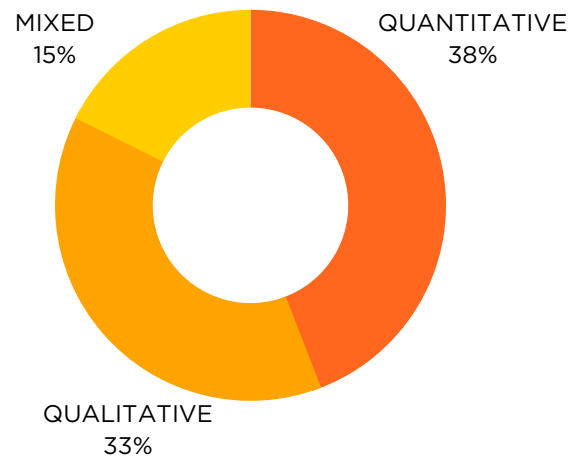

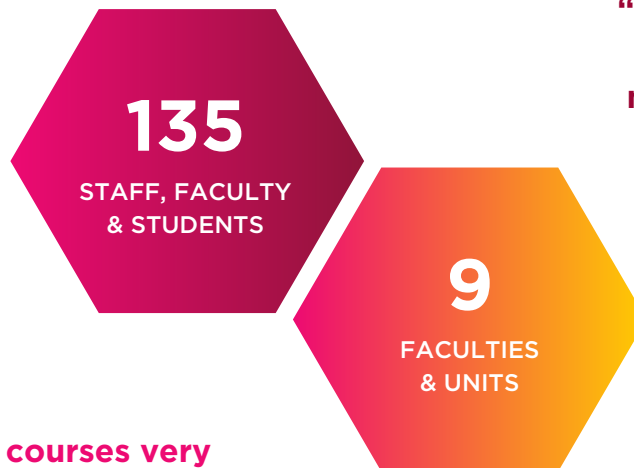
COMMUNITY CONVERSATIONS
